

Ngozi Ndulue is an Associate Professor of Law and the Director of the Post-Conviction Criminal Defense Clinic at the University of the District of Columbia David A. Clarke School of Law. Ngozi's scholarship focuses on clinical pedagogy, post-conviction remedies, the death penalty, wrongful convictions, and racial justice. She serves on the board of Witness to Innocence and of the Criminal Law and Juvenile Justice Section of the National Bar Association.

Ngozi regularly conducts trainings to educate the public and the legal community. In 2024-25, she presented at trainings organized by the Legal Defense Fund, the Defender Services Office, the Florida Association for Criminal Defense Lawyers, Habeas Assistance and Training Counsel, the Federal Public Defender for the Northern District of Ohio, and the Federal Defenders for the Middle District of Alabama. She has conducted CLEs and webinars for the National Bar Association, the Practicing Law Institute, the Pennsylvania Bar Institute, and many other organizations.

Before joining UDC law, Ngozi served in several non-profit leadership roles focused on racial justice, the criminal legal system, and indigent defense. Most recently, Ngozi was the Innocence Project's first Special Advisor on Race and Wrongful Conviction. In this role, Ngozi provided expertise on racial justice, equity, bias and discrimination and its impact on the functioning of the criminal legal system. Ngozi has held leadership positions at the Death Penalty Information Center, the national NAACP, and the Ohio Justice & Policy Center. Ngozi also served as an Assistant Federal Public Defender in the Arizona Capital Habeas Unit from 2008-2011. Ngozi has a law degree from Yale Law School and a bachelor's degree from the University of Cincinnati.
